- Registration will be conducted online. If you would prefer a paper registration form, please contact the Education Office. Please carefully read the registration section on page 2 to understand the process. Your registration form (electronic or paper) must be returned to the Education Office by noon on Monday, May 16, 2022.

How to Register:

C<u>omplete a registration form</u>, either electronic or paper, to request courses that you would like to take. The electronic link will be emailed to you no later than May 9. Paper forms are available in the Education Office.

When completing the form:

- List your choices in order of preference.
- Tell us the total number of classes you would like to take.
- Remember that requesting a class does not necessarily mean you will be enrolled in it.
- If you anticipate missing two or more sessions of a class, choose a different class to make room for neighbors who can attend all of the sessions.
- Remember to list the courses you "always" take, such as Voices of Experience.

Ancient Greek Vase Painting Hank B. Friday, May 13, 10:00 AM Froebel Classroom, 130C

How did the Greeks of 500 BC visualize their gods? When they thought of or worshipped Zeus, Hermes, Athena, or Herakles, what did they see in their mind's eye? Many of the estimated 50,000 surviving painted vases allow us to see what they may have seen. What we call "Greek Mythology" becomes vivid before us.

Furthermore, images on many vases provide clues as to the life of ordinary Greeks. They allow us to see the rhapsodes who sang the Iliad, students in a classroom, boxers in the athletic contests, women at the water fountain, brides being escorted to their wedding, men harvesting olives . . .

Hank B. will provide an overview of ancient Greek vase painting with illustrations from a very small sample of the many thousands of vases which have been recovered from tombs and other archeological sites.

<u>Presenter:</u> Hank B. taught college English and Linguistics for 40 years. Since taking an undergraduate course on ancient art, he has been an amateur student of ancient Greek vase paintings and has visited vase collections in many museums in The United States and Europe. His degrees are from Princeton and Harvard.

The United Nations, Ukraine and Russia

Claude W. and Lawrence C. Ph.D. Thursdays, May 12 and May 19, 10:00 – 11:30 AM Ballroom, Zoom and Ch. 918

The Russian invasion of Ukraine that began on February 24th of this year has raised several questions about the history of these two nations and the role of the international community. In a pair of talks, Drs. W. and C. will give background on the United Nations and the Russia-Ukraine war. In the first talk, the duo will present on the histories of the League of Nations and United Nations with respect to peacekeeping, the relative roles of the General Assembly and Security Council, and how those roles impact the current situation given Russia's position as a permanent member of the Security Council. In the second talk, Dr. C. will address the war in Ukraine from a military and historical perspective, including background on the region under the Russian Empire and Soviet Union, the Russian Federation's annexation of Crimea in 2014 and the ongoing fighting since that time, and the more immediate circumstances of the 2022 war.

<u>Presenters</u>: Claude W. taught about Africa for 55 years at the University at Buffalo. He carried out extensive field research in many African countries. Claude received Lifetime Achievement Awards from the New York African Studies Association, the American Political Science Association, and the International Studies Association, plus several teaching awards. TIAA and the SUNY Research Foundation gave Claude its first-ever Lifetime Achievement Award.

Former Lasell Village resident Dr. C. is a former senior officer in the United States Air Force and spent over 30 years in military service. He continues to provide consultation within the broad range of the national security enterprise. He has two doctorates, one in clinical and educational psychology from Indiana University and the other in history with a specific focus on Soviet and Military History from Boston College and has several years of teaching experience in both of these disciplines.

Cinderella Sue B. Tuesdays, August 2 and August 9 10-11:30 AM Ballroom

Our beloved rags-to-riches Cinderella began her literary life in 1634 as a princess who murdered her stepmother to get a more agreeable one. Over the next 350 years Cinderella's beginnings became humbler and her behavior more virtuous: the late 17th-century Frenchman Charles Perrault, the 19th-century German Wilhelm Grimm, and the 20th-century Walt Disney Studios edited Cinderella's origins and her relationships with mother, stepmother, stepsisters, and animals into successive models for girls of their day.

Space is limited, registration is required for this workshop. Please see Tab 4 in the Sign-up Book at the Resident Services Desk.

<u>Presenter:</u> For over 30 years Sue B. has taught, written about, and lectured on fairy tales in general and "Cinderella" in particular. In the tale's initial appearance in 1634 as "La Gatta Cenerentola," the heroine takes matters into her own hands and murders her first stepmother, a plot that in later generations was significantly revised to make its rags to riches heroine socially and morally attractive.

Lasell Village Courses

 Learning Spanish through Salsa Music José G.
 Mondays and Wednesdays, June 1 – June 27, 9:45 – 11:15 AM
 Ballroom

The main objective of this course is to help you acquire basic communication skills in the Spanish language and to introduce you to some of the most common practices and cultures of the Hispanic world like music, art, food, etc. This course will also focus on correct use of basic structures (grammar) and vocabulary. In this course, students will also practice some basic salsa music steps while using the vocabulary learned in each class.

Course Materials: Please bring a notebook and a pencil.

Presenter: José G. is an Associate Professor of Spanish at Lasell University and holds a Ph.D. in Latin American Literature from the University of Salamanca, Spain. Guzmán has been teaching at Lasell for the last 10 years and has shared his love for languages and cultures with his students.

2. The Voices of Experience sing *Cinderella*

Jonathan K. Mondays, June 6 – August 22 (no class July 4) 1:15-2:45 PM Performances August 23 at 7:30 PM and August 24 at 2:00 PM Ballroom

In 1957, CBS decided to create a Broadway-style musical that could be seen in every living room across America. Since Broadway was synonymous with Rogers and Hammerstein at the time, the famous team was invited to write a television musical based on the story of Cinderella! That show was remade twice for television over the years before finally making its way to a live Broadway audience in 2013. For this semester of Voices of Experience, we will be doing our own version of the show, adding to the list of productions that have gone up in the past. Sounds tough? Remember that "Impossible" things are happening every day!

<u>Course materials</u>: Please bring a black 3-ring binder and a pencil.

<u>Course leader</u>: Jonathan K. has been writing, playing, and teaching music for much of his life. Starting at a very young age at the piano, he went on to study film scoring and contemporary composition at Berklee College of Music in Boston. He has worked with and directed choirs, orchestras, marching bands, drum corps, and various other ensembles for many years. He now teaches private music lessons, writes and arranges music, and plays in orchestra pits full time.

Brooke M-D. Tuesdays, May 31 – July 5 10:00 – 11:30 AM

In this class, we will explore the earliest art that laid the foundations for later Western art. Beginning with European cave paintings and sculptures of the stone age, we will move through art of Mesopotamia, Egypt, and the ancient Aegean world, looking at architecture, frescoes, pottery, and sculpture. No prior art history knowledge is necessary for this broad survey course.

<u>Required reading</u>: *Art: A World History* by Elke Linda Buchholz et al., ISBN-13: 978-0810994423.

<u>Course Leader</u>: Brooke M-D is an artist whose sculptures and drawings have been exhibited in many solo and group shows. Currently teaching Studio Art and Art History at Lasell University, Cape Cod Community College, Bristol Community College, and the Community College of Rhode Island, Brooke received her MFA in Sculpture from the University of Massachusetts-Dartmouth, and her BFA in Studio Art from the University of Oklahoma, which also awarded her a BA in Philosophy. Brooke holds minors in Art History and Psychology, also from the University of Oklahoma.

21. Creative Writing: Poetry Workshop (just added!)

Tuesdays: June 7, June 21, July 12, July 26, and August 9 10:00 – 11:30 AM

The Creative Writing Poetry Workshop is designed for intermediate and advanced writers and provides students with an opportunity to compose and revise original poems in a supportive environment. The course will introduce a new focus each week, which will include a representative reading and prompt. Students will submit poems for peer review each week and provide feedback on their peers' poems for discussion in class. Participants will submit a portfolio of revised poems at the end of the course.

<u>Required Reading:</u> Short readings will be distributed in class and shared via email. <u>Assignments:</u> Original poems shared for each class, a final portfolio of revised poems

<u>Course leader:</u> Sara L. has a PhD in Rhetoric & Writing Studies and an MFA in Creative Writing, Poetry. Dr. L. is an Assistant Professor of Writing at Lasell University, where she teaches courses in the Writing Program and Core Curriculum, facilitates professional development for new adjunct faculty, and serves as the Director of the Writing Across the Curriculum Program. Dr. L. frequently presents on panels at local and national conferences on writing and teaching. She has taught English and Writing at many institutions across the U.S. and even spent one year teaching in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia. She has published poems in *New South* and *Redactions*.

5. History of Capitalism

Holger D.

Tuesdays and Thursdays, July 7-26

1:00 – 2:30 PM

What is capitalism? When and how did it originate? And when and how will it end? In this course, we will focus on modern capitalism as an economic, social, and cultural formation in global perspective. To approach these big questions, we will read Sven Beckert's *Empire of Cotton* (Knopf, 2014), which traces the history of global capitalism through one of its most important commodities: cotton. Topics to be discussed include colonialism, enslavement, industrialization, social movements, and climate change.

<u>Course Materials:</u> Sven Beckert, *Empire of Cotton: A Global History,* Knopf, 2014; Paperback (2015), ISBN: 978-0375713965

Course Leader: Holger D. is an historian of 19th- and 20th-century U.S. history, with a special focus on imperialism, capitalism, and the Pacific Ocean. His current project tells the global story of non-citizen civilians working for the U.S. military from the Civil War to Iraq. He holds a Ph.D. in History of American Civilization from Harvard University and M.A. in American Cultural History from LMU, Munich.

6. Have Fun and Explore Working with Color

Susan K. Tuesdays, May 31 – July 5 3:00 – 4:30 PM Art Studio, 80B

In the course of this class, each student will explore a work by their favorite historical artist to learn and experiment with color. Example/suggested artists: Monet, Picasso, Cezanne, Zorn, Manet, Degas, Matilda Browne, Mary Cassatt, Frits Thaulow. Artists are not limited to those listed and may exhibit any style you want to explore – you just have to love it! Bring in an example of a work by the artist you have chosen even if it is a different medium than you are working in.

<u>Suggested media</u>: Soft Pastels or Oil Paints. Acrylics are fine as well. Students who took Susan Kelley's previous class in Charcoal or Pencil are welcome to continue in those media as well. The class will begin with a few exercises in limited color before digging deeper into color.

<u>Course Materials:</u> To the first class bring the materials you have already, and we can add or subtract as needed. For those who are choosing materials, wait until the first class. Course Leader will provide some materials for the first exercises in your chosen medium. It is helpful to bring your own drawing board or foam core board. Please wear or bring apron or oversize shirts to protect clothing from paints and materials. <u>Course leader</u>: Inspired by working from life in oil, pastel, and charcoal, Susan paints landscapes, portraits, and still life. She is an active plein air painter throughout New England including the North Shore / Cape Ann, Rhode Island and Maine. In 2005 she began teaching classes for educational institutions and organizations, including Rockport Art Association and Museum, North Shore Art Association, JCC Newton and private instruction. She has painted with passion and a commitment to executing works each better than the last. Susan studied 6 years with 3 noted teachers of the Boston School tradition. Master Landscape Painter David Curtis, Master Portrait Artist Robert Cormier and Master Boston Painter Thomas Dunlay. She currently maintains a resident studio in Franklin and works and teaches in the Thomas Dunlay studios/Atelier continuing the Boston school tradition.

7. The 1850's: A Fraught Decade Doris G. and Hank B. Wednesdays, June 8 – August 3 (no class June 22) 10:00 – 11:30 AM Froebel Classroom, 130C

Can you imagine a time in American history when racism and race-related violence were serious public issues; a time when people took note of a steep growth in sectionalism, observing that the parts of the nation were becoming more and more different from one another; when the Supreme Court struck many as too conservative a branch of government; when the rights of women, immigrants, and Indigenous peoples were affirmed and denied with intensity? In this interdisciplinary class on the decade of the 1850's we will explore these and other issues from the war with Mexico to the secession of the southern states. Readings for the history side of the story will be drawn from David Potter's *The Impending Crisis*.

Melville, Hawthorne, Thoreau, and Whitman all published major works in the 1850's. Although long regarded as timeless masterpieces of American literature, these works reflect the historical moment in which they were written. With the goal of understanding their relation to the important issues of their times, we will read and discuss short excerpts from some of those works as well as from works by other writers who were popular at the time, but who are little read today.

<u>Course Leaders:</u> Doris G. taught History at Fairleigh Dickinson University in the early 1960s and for forty-one years at the Dwight-Englewood School, as Acting Principal of the Upper School, and as administrator of several grants, including two Masterwork Study Grants from the National Endowment of the Humanities. She has a B.A. in History and Government from Douglass College, a M.A. in History from the University of Wisconsin, and an M.A.T. (Master of Arts in Teaching) from Fairleigh Dickinson University.

Hank B., a Village resident since August 2018, holds degrees from Princeton and Harvard. He has taught on every level from seventh grade English to graduate psycholinguistics. His upper-level college course subjects included English Romantics and American Poetry.

8. What Makes Sondheim Great? Act II Gail L. W. Wednesdays, June 29–Aug 3 1:00– 2:30 PM Ballroom

The late Stephen Sondheim is commonly thought to be the most important musical theater composer and lyricist of the past fifty years, and the single most influential force in bringing the Broadway musical into the modern era. What makes him great?

In this class, we will unpack some of Sondheim's innovative musicals: *West Side Story, Into the Woods, A Little Night Music, Merrily We Roll Along,* and *Pacific Overtures.* We'll explore the idea that Sondheim functions as a "playwright in song," in both lyrics *and* music, crafting songs that deepen the characters and further the plot. The class will include opportunities for students to share their reactions to what they have read, heard and viewed and to practice analyzing Sondheim's songs. You do not have to have taken a prior Sondheim course or even be familiar with Sondheim to be able to enjoy this class.

Optional homework will include short readings, and opportunities to listen to music and to see videos of full shows.

<u>Course Leader</u>: Gail L.-W., now retired, spends her time studying and teaching about the works of Stephen Sondheim. She facilitates an online, national "Sondheim Study Group," and gives periodic webinars comparing the works of Sondheim to that of other composers and lyricists. She has taught about Sondheim at Lasell Village, for BU's Rainbow Lifetime Learning, and at the Osher Lifelong Learning Institutes at Tufts University and UMass Boston. Gail has a Masters in Performance Studies from NYU and a BA in Drama from UC Berkeley.

9. Improving Your Play at Contract Bridge Brian F. Wednesdays, June 1 – July 6 Rogers, 85A 1:00 -2:30 PM

This course will focus on the play of the hand and help you develop both simple techniques like finesse, promotion, and ruffing as well as more advanced techniques like endplays, squeezes, and eliminations. Ample time will be given to instruction and to practice. No partner necessary and all levels are welcome.

<u>Course leader</u>: Dr. Brian F. is a professor of mathematics at Lasell College. He attended Tufts University as an undergraduate where he earned a BS in Chemical Engineering; and the University of Massachusetts-Lowell, earning two masters (Mathematics and Education), and Doctorate in Mathematics Education. His research interests include the development of teaching techniques designed to foster logical thinking through the learning of mathematics. Dr. F. has been teaching at a variety of levels for 20 years and has an extensive background in K-12 teacher preparation. His practice revolves around making sense out of abstract mathematical concepts and using mathematical content to help his students become better thinkers. Dr. F. is tremendously excited to offer this Bridge course as a means through which he can bring his mission of improving thinking skills to the residents of Lasell Village.

10. Black Bodies in Motion: Dance in the African Diaspora

2:30 – 4:00 PM

We will examine concert dances, religious dances, and vernacular dances of the African Diaspora as forms of embodied knowledge and intellectual history. By reading texts and observing dance performances, we will look at Africanist practices and dance as sources of cultural creation.

Particular attention will be paid to aesthetic principles and ideas transmitted through bodies and performances. From this course, we will derive a greater understanding of the importance of dance in the African Diaspora and the various ways the movement of black bodies offers alternative sources of cultural meaning.

<u>Course leader</u>: C Dale G. is an Americanist specializing in intellectual history, religion, culture, race, and African American Studies. She holds master degrees in theological studies and history and is currently completing her doctoral dissertation entitled "From Revelations to Grace: Dancing the African American Religious Experience" in the History of American Civilization (American Studies) at Harvard University. Prior to graduate school, she worked in the corporate and nonprofit sectors. 12. ISIS, Wagner, and the Chinese in Africa Ballroom
13. ISIS, Wagner, and the Chinese in Africa Zoom
14. ISIS, Wagner, and the Chinese in Africa Channel 918 Lawrence C., Ph.D.
Thursdays, June 23 - July 7, 2022

The continent of Africa contains a huge amount of essential minerals and metals in order to meet the technological needs of industry in the United States. ISIS, the Russia-based Wagner private military group, and the Chinese, for their own specific reasons among other objectives, are moving to create obstacles for the United States in obtaining the needed minerals and metals from Africa. The three-day course on June 23, 30 and July 7, 2022 will discuss the interactions created by ISIS, Wagner, and the Chinese operating alone and in cooperation to block the United States' efforts in Africa. The course will identify about a dozen countries in Africa that are affected by these three powerful influences and explain how the United States diplomats and Special Operations Forces are moving to deter ISIS, Wagner, and the Chinese.

<u>Course leader</u>: Former Lasell Village resident Lawrence C., Ph.D. is a former senior officer in the United States Air Force and spent over 30 years in military service. He continues to provide consultation within the broad range of the national security enterprise. He has two doctorates, one in clinical and educational psychology from Indiana University and the other in history with a specific focus on Soviet and Military History from Boston College and has several years of teaching experience in both of these disciplines.

15. Understanding the Global Economy *Ballroom*

16. Understanding the Global Economy Zoom

Allan R. Thursdays, July 14 – August 18

10:00 – 11:30 AM

While this course is not a course in Economics, it will unfold the story of how the modern global economy evolved and of how it works: When Matt knocks on your door to deliver a package containing a camera you ordered on line from Amazon, how did that camera—produced by a Japanese company, manufactured in a plant in China, under a patent licensed to it and using parts manufactured in Vietnam and Thailand—get in the box and through customs in San Francisco? We'll develop that story by tracing how a hypothetical small, local business might make its first sale to a customer in a foreign country. We'll then follow a step-by-step process that might lead to our hypothetical firm becoming a multinational company.

We'll also see how political and competitive differences, such as those between the U.S. and China or Boeing and Airbus occasionally create bumps in the path. Or watch McDonald's restaurant in Moscow's Pushkinskaya Square become collateral damage of Putin's invasion of Ukraine.

In short, the course is intended to be a 6-week story to help understand how people, goods, and capital move throughout the globe in the 21st century.

<u>Course leader</u>: After law school, Allan R. practiced with a NJ law firm before joining the S.E.C. staff in Washington. When illegal activities threatened the survival of the American Stock Exchange, he became part of the team assigned to reorganize the exchange. That experience led Allan to serving as a technical consultant for capital market development in emerging economies. To train people for roles in those markets, the dean of the newly formed Graduate School of Management at Rutgers University agreed to let him set up a training center and to continue technical consulting. Allan continued at Rutgers and doing overseas work until both he and his wife Debbie retired and moved to Boston in 2000. While in Boston, he has led courses at HILR, including this course.
